It's Banned Books Week and the library is educating students about popular titles that have been "banned" (challenged or removed) from schools and libraries. Banned Books Week was launched in 1982 in response to a sudden surge in the number of challenges to books in schools, bookstores and libraries. More than 11,300 books have been challenged since 1982 according to the American Library Association. The 10 most challenged titles of 2015 included popular YA titles such as:

- 1. Looking for Alaska, by John Green Reasons: Offensive language, sexually explicit, and unsuited f or age group.
- 2. Beyond Magenta: Transgender Teens Speak Out, by Susan Kuklin

Reasons: Anti-family, offensive language, homosexuality, sex education, political viewpoint, religious viewpoint, unsuited for age group, and other ("wants to remove from collection to ward off complaints").

3. The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time, by Mark Haddon

Reasons: Offensive language, religious viewpoint, unsuited for age group, and other ("profanity and atheism").


- 4. *Habibi*, by Craig Thompson Reasons: Nudity, sexually explicit, and unsuited for age group.
- 5. Two Boys Kissing, by David Levithan Reasons: Homosexuality and other ("condones public displays of affection").



2nd Cohort of Rutgers Mini Medical Honors Program- This year, 17 HHS students were accepted into the 2016 Rutgers Mini-Medical Honors program at Rutgers University in Newark. The HHS students will participate in an eight-week evening program, throughout October and November, along with students from 40 other New Jersey high schools. They will take part in lectures, seminars, meaningful interactions, authentic learning experiences and small group discussions that were created by members of the faculty of the New Jersey Medical School and facilitated by medical school students.



A group of 5 female HHS students attended the The Young Women in Biology (YWIB) Discovering Science Careers in "Pharma Today" at the Pfizer-Centers for Therapeutic Innovation (CTI) headquarters in NYC. YWIB works with sponsors to create programs and events geared towards encouraging female students to consider STEM careers. The students were engaged in discussion on how pharmaceutical companies are perceived, attended a panel discussion of employees at Pfizer and also toured the laboratory.



Attendance, Attendance, Attendance...... students must be in school! It is imperative that students come to school every day. In order to learn, students must be present. My attendance team will be monitoring student attendance and will be setting up meetings with parents when students hit eight absences. The state requires that all students be in school 163 days of every year. When a student hits 18 absences, they are at risk of losing credit for that year. It is imperative that you work with your child to ensure that they attend school.






Tricks of the Trade: Mad Men Style
